METHODOLOGY

GENERAL POPULATION: In 2018, Cabarrus County's estimated general population size was 211, 342. (Census, 2018).¹

SAMPLING FRAME: Respondents were eligible to participate in the survey if they were over 18 years of age and residents of Cabarrus County. It is estimated that 25.7% (n= 54,217) of the County's population is under 18 years of age, making them ineligible to participate. In 2018, the estimated adult population in 2018 was 157,125. This number is more accurate to describe the sampling frame for the Community Needs Assessment.

SAMPLING METHODS: The Community Planning Council decided to collect a stratified convenience sample. The goal 1.18% of the population was made to best reduce the potential for bias that is associated with convenience sampling. A list of stratified target populations (age, gender, race, zip code, income level and education level) was created. There was a focus on locations where target populations could be assessed. Examples included Meals on Wheels, various clinics, and community health education events. The Community Planning Council was able to sample 1.7% of Cabarrus County's adult population.

SURVEY MODE: The survey was available to the public for three months (December 4, 2019 -March 4, 2020). Cabarrus Health Alliance staff along with community partners distributed surveys through email listservs, social media, organizations, events, and at different locations. Surveys were available in both English and Spanish and were available online and by paper. Surveys were self-administered and anonymous.

SAMPLE SIZE: The Community Planning Council successfully sampled 1.7% (n=2,711) of the adult population (n=157, 125). There was a total of 2,944 surveys collected. However, 233 respondents did not fit the eligibility criteria of being a resident of Cabarrus County, so their responses were not included.

MARGIN OF ERROR & CONFIDENCE LEVEL: Because the sample size was 2,711 respondents, there is a 2% margin of error that the probability of the sample accurately reflects the adult population of Cabarrus County. This means that there is a 95% likelihood (give or take 2%) that the adult population of Cabarrus County would respond similarly to these survey questions.²

QUESTION 1 RESIDENCY IN CABARRUS COUNTY

Respondents were asked to identify whether they were a resident of Cabarrus County. Of the 2,944 respondents, all responded to this question. Respondents that answered "no" to this question were unable to continue the survey as they did not fit the eligibility criteria.

Of the 2,944 respondents that answered, the following answers were given: 92% (n=2711) reported that they were a resident of Cabarrus County 8% (n=233) reported that they were not a resident of Cabarrus County



QUESTION 2 BARRIERS TO EATING FRUITS & VEGETABLES

Respondents were asked to identify any barriers they experienced that prevented them from eating fruits and vegetables daily. Of the 2711 respondents, 2,428 answered this question. Over two-thirds of respondents (70.6%, n= 1,715) reported that they did in fact eat fruits and vegetables daily.

For those who reported having a barrier the prevents them from eating fruits and vegetables, the following answers were given (29.4%, n=713):

75.6% (n= 539) reported that they were too expensive 15.1% (n= 108) reported that there was a lack of access to fruits and vegetables 14.3% (n=102) reported that they did not know how to cook fruits and vegetables 10.7% (n=76) reported that they did not like fruits and vegetables 48.0% (n=342) reported that they did not have enough time to cook or prepare 9.3% (n= 66) reported "other" as a barrier



QUESTION 3 WEEKLY DURATION OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Respondents were asked to report how much time they engaged in moderate physical activity (in minutes) during a typical week. Out of 2,711 respondents, 2,430 answered this question. Less than one-tenth of respondents (7%, n=171) reported that they did not engage in any physical activity during the week.

Among those who reported that they engaged in physical activity during the week (93%, n= 2,259), the following answers were given:

23.3% (n=527) reported less than 30 minutes per week
26.5% (n=599) reported 30-60 minutes per week
18.5% (n=419) reported 60-100 minutes per week
13.7% (n=309) reported 100-150 minutes per week
17.8% (n=401) reported 150 minutes or more per week



QUESTION 4 LOCATION OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Respondents were asked to report the locations where they exercised or participated in physical activity. Out of 2,711 respondents, only 2,428 responded to this question. About one-tenth of respondents (13.5%, n=327) reported that they do not exercise.

Among those who exercised (86.5%, n= 2,101), the following answers were given:

27.9% (n=586) listed parks or trails
54.8% (n=1152) listed home

QUESTION 5 BARRIERS TO PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Respondents were asked to report reasons why they do not exercise. Out of 2,711 respondents, 2,326 responded to this question. About half (46.6%, n=1,083) of respondents reported that they exercise.

Out of those who reported a barrier to exercise (53.4%, n=1,243), these were the answers given:

51.0% (n= 634) reported lack of motivation
57.7% (n= 717) reported lack of time
46.7% (n= 580) reported family obligations (cooking, cleaning, household work)
11.3% (n= 140) reported they did not have childcare
5.6% (n= 70) reported no safe to exercise
12.0% (n= 149) reported they were physically unable
4.1% (n=51) reported transportation
14.8% (n= 184) reported cost
3.4% (n= 42) reported other



QUESTION 6 PREVENTATIVE MEDICAL CARE

Respondents were asked to report if they or their family members seek regular or preventative medical care. Out of 2,711 respondents, 2,236 answered this question.

Of those that responded, these answers were given: 86.1% (n=1,926) reported Yes

13.9% (n=310) reported No



QUESTION 7 DIFFICULTY IN RECEIVING HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Respondents were asked if anyone in their houshold had had a problem receiving healthcare services. Out of 2,711 respondents, 1,910 responded to this question. Over half of the respondents (60.8%, n=1162) answered "not applicable", so these respondents were assumed to have not had any difficulties in receiving health care services.

Out of those who reported problems (39.2%, n=748), these were the answers given:

About half of the respondents (80.1%, n=1,493) reported that they did not have anyone in their household with a chronic disabling condition.

Respondents were asked to report how many children that were living in their household. Out of 2,711 respondents, only 2,214 responded to the question. About half of the respondents (50.4%, n=1,116) responded that 0 children lived in their household. Those that answered 0 were instructed to skip to question #22 as the following questions were focused on children.

QUESTION 29 CHILD PRESENCE DURING PHYSICAL AND VERBAL ABUSE

Respondents were asked whether children were present during times of abuse. Out of 2,711 respondents, only 1,879 answered this question. Most (77.2%, n=1,451) reported that they did not experience physical, verbal abuse or mistreatment.

Among those who reported abuse (22.8%, n=428) the following answers were given: 14.0% (n=60) reported Yes, children were present 86.0% (n=368) reported No, children were not present



QUESTION 30 PORTRAYAL OF THOSE WITH DRUG/SUBSTANCE ADDICTION

Respondents were asked to report their beliefs associated with people addicted any drug or substance. Out of 2,711 respondents, only 1,882 answered this question.

Community Needs Assessment Community Planning Council Commitment

Background: Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is a process to determine the health status, needs, and resources in a county. The CNA is conducted every four years and culminates in a report to be distributed to the community. It is important to note that the process is not intended to develop solutions, but rather to identify the *needs and gaps* in a community, spark analysis and debate, and result in agencies, businesses, individuals and organizations engaging in strategic planning and program planning to address the needs.

A Community Planning Council has been convened with each CNA- in 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, and 2016. The Council is made up of a diverse group of representatives and includes health and human services, the faith community, education, city and county government, foundations, businesses, and community volunteers. The primary role of the Planning Council is to collect, analyze, and interpret County data, develop the CNA document, and disseminate the results to the community.

Personal Characteristics Desired:

- Possess an ability to listen, analyze, think clearly and creatively, and work well with people individually and in a group.
- Willing to prepare for and attend community planning council meetings, ask questions, take responsibility, and follow through on assignments.
- Possess honesty, integrity, sensitivity to and tolerance of different views, and ability to disseminate pertinent information.
- Shares common vision and mission of Healthy Cabarrus.

Individual Community Planning Council Member Responsibilities:

- Review the agenda and supporting materials prior to meetings.
- Provide statistics and data; assist with community survey collection; and other forms of information pertaining to your area of expertise.
- Be active in discussion; ask questions and provide feedback to presenters.
- Assist in prioritizing community needs and gaps.
- Serve on subcommittees when applicable.
- Disseminate CNA findings and processes with community members.

A History of Collaborative Success

1998 - 2003 | 2004 - 2007 | 2008 - 2011 | 2012 - 2015 | 2016 - 2019

1998: Healthy Cabarrus is founded. Original community partners included Gina Goff (Cabarrus Health Alliance), Dianne Snyder (Northeast Medical Center), Cappie Stanley (Cabarrus Health Alliance), and Anne Laukitis (Partnership for Children).

2000 - 2003

1999: Partnered with the United Way to complete the 2000 Community Needs Assessment.

1999: Established a Dental Task Force, an organized efforts among dentists and other community partners to address the issue of access to dental care. Within two years, over 2,000 children were provided dental exams and fluoride varnish through the generous support of donated care from 22 local dentists.

2001: Development of the <u>Community Care Plan</u>, a partnership between public, private, and non-profit health providers to provide donated healthcare for almost 9,000 uninsured residents in the span of four years. Cabarrus received \$2.5 million in federal funding to initiate this program.

2001: Approximately 400 low-income children receive <u>NC Health Choice</u> Insurance due to premiums paid by \$19,000 in donations sought by Healthy Cabarrus. Created a 24-hour teen telephone health hotline called *Teen Talk*.

2003: Coordinated a local system and provided \$205,000 worth of prescription medications in response to the needs of displaced <u>Pillowtex</u> workers.

2003: Successfully sought \$353,000 in grant funding to support the establishment of comprehensive dental services for nursing home residents and special needs populations in Cabarrus and neighboring counties.

2003: <u>Give Kids a Smile</u> established in Cabarrus County with the goal of garnering donated dental care (free dental cleanings) for uninsured children.

2004 - 2007

2003: Partnered with the United Way to complete the 2004 Community Needs Assessment.

2004: Advocated for the transportation needs of the underserved. Established and disseminated a Transportation Position Statement. Provided technical assistance in grant writing to support the development of a public transit program, CK Rider.

2005: A local 24-hour <u>ACCESS/Crisis Line</u> was created (1-800-939-5911) and remains in operation through Cardinal Innovations. A <u>Crisis Recovery Center</u> was established for the

community. In addition, a two-year pilot project began to enhance the diagnosis and treatment of depression for patients in primary care offices.

2005: Established *Men for Living*, a volunteer advocate group of over 40 African American men to promote prostate cancer screening and provide educational trainings, including awareness breakfasts and barber shop outreach.

2006: Increased the number of pediatric dentists in Cabarrus County from 0 to 2. Established dental services in the hospital operation room to provide specialized dental treatment for low-income children, the elderly, and special needs residents. Expanded the Cabarrus Health Alliance dental clinic's capacity from 6 chairs to 12 chairs.

2006: Gathered baseline data on substance use among Cabarrus County middle and high school students. Established Teen Task Force, a youth-led coalition that has implemented local health campaigns in Cabarrus County over the past ten years, including *Hands on the Wheel* (no texting and driving), *Kick Butts 5K* (smoke-free lifestyle), *Feeding Frenzy 5K* (hunger action), and antibullying messages.

2006: <u>Cabarrus Community Health Center</u>, a federally qualified health center, opened to provide primary healthcare to a high-need community.

2007: Expanded local medication assistance programs to assist uninsured, low-income residents in getting prescription medications. Received 3 grant awards from Health & Wellness Trust Fund. Developed a local resource guide for medication assistance. Cabarrus Senior Center and other community partners created a Medicare Part D information to help seniors access prescription medications.

2008 - 2011

2007: Partnered with the United Way to complete the 2008 Community Needs Assessment.

2008: Created a smoke-free dining guide for Cabarrus County, including 150 local restaurants that were 100% smoke-free. <u>Teen TRU Crews</u> established at local high schools to build support for tobacco-free policies. Implemented a tobacco prevention curriculum in all Cabarrus County middle schools. Cabarrus County Dental Society hosted an educational training on the oral health effects of spit tobacco.

2008: Established a broad safety-net system for providing primary healthcare for lowincome/uninsured residents. Safety-net providers include: Cabarrus Community Health Center, Community Free Clinic, Southern Piedmont Community Care Plan, Cabarrus Health Alliance, CMC-Northeast, private medical providers, Cooperative Christian Ministry, and DSS.

2008: Community partner <u>PBH</u> (now Cardinal Innovations) establishes Community Lunch & Learn sessions, offers Cultural Competency trainings, and provides Crisis Intervention Training for law enforcement officers. A new mobile crisis service is established.

2009: Implemented a childhood obesity prevention program throughout Cabarrus County with 12 month funding from NC Department of Health & Human Services. Resulted in the establishment of a Childhood Obesity Prevention Partnership, including 25 community partners seeking to reduce childhood obesity in Cabarrus County; low-fat milk policy change at childcare centers; administering the Youth Risk Behavioral Survey among high school students. Trained 20 health providers as childhood obesity advocates within the school systems with funding from NICHQ.

2010: Partnered with Cabarrus Health Alliance to implement the <u>ACHIEVE</u> grant. During the two-year project, community agencies adopted 21 policies and made 18 environmental changes.

2011: Local municipalities (Cabarrus County, City of Concord, and City of Kannapolis) pass tobacco-free policies in all parks, which led to a domino-effect of many other campuses going smoke-free.

2012 - 2015

2011: Facilitated the county's 2012 Community Needs Assessment with community partners.

2013: Established <u>Triple P</u> Cabarrus, a population level approach to train Cabarrus workforce on positive parenting strategies, with aims to reduce out-of-home placements, reduce substantiated child abuse cases, and reduce ER visits for child maltreatment injuries.

2013: Founded the Cabarrus Wellness Coalition to address reduce obesity rates and prevent diabetes. Launched the Cabarrus County <u>Southeastern Diabetes Initiative</u>, a service-oriented community-based program designed to support individuals living with Type 2 diabetes. Began offering <u>healthy cooking classes</u> to the general public at CHA's Wellness Kitchen.

2013: Hosted a community forum of 90 participants on prescription medication safety. Founded the <u>Substance Use Coalition</u> to address prescription medication safety. Co-hosted with Safe Kids Cabarrus and the Cabarrus County Sherriff's Office a prescription drug take-back event. Administered a Youth Substance Use survey across all middle and high schools in the county. Teen Task Force members worked to create a billboard campaign targeting teens and substance use.

2014: Received CDC funding to carry out REACH (Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health). Currently providing support to Cabarrus Wellness Coalition to implement local strategies to reduce health disparities in chronic disease.

2015: Facilitating a local team of community partners interested <u>Community Centered Health</u> <u>Homes</u>, an upstream approach to healthcare that bridges the gap between medical services and community prevention. Other team members include: Community Care of Southern Piedmont, Cabarrus Rowan Community Health Centers, Community Free Clinic, and Cabarrus Partnership for Children.

2016 - 2019

2016: Facilitated the Cabarrus County 2016 Community Needs Assessment with 40 partners from across the community.

Cabarrus Health Alliance opens the regions first Syringe Exchange Program, providing clean injecting supplies, free HIV and Hepatitis C testing and referral to treatment and community resources for people who inject drugs.

2017: CommUNITY Conversations were hosted across Cabarrus County through a collaboration between the Cabarrus County Sheriff's Office, Concord Police Department, Kannapolis Police Department, Cabarrus County Emergency Medical Services, Healthy Cabarrus Substance Use Coalition, and Cabarrus Health Alliance. The events provide information on the current opioid crisis in Cabarrus County, signs and symptoms, how to access treatment and service, plus a personal story from a person in recovery or a family who lost a loved one.

Cabarrus County Commissioners and County Manager Mike Downs created the Mental Health Advisory Board and convened over 25 partners in the field who can directly impact mental health in Cabarrus County. The Advisory Board created the Mental Health Task Force which consists of three work groups: Access to Care, Crisis Response, and Public Awareness.

The Cabarrus County Partnership for Children, Cabarrus Health Alliance, and Cabarrus Wellness Coalition created the 'Cabarrus Play and Grow Map'. The child-friendly map illustrates physical activity and nutrition activities such community gardens, parks and playgrounds to help children and families establish healthy habits for life.

With support from Carolinas HealthCare System, 50 school nutrition site managers, directors and healthcare volunteers were trained in the principles of Smarter Lunchrooms Movement. Smarter Lunchrooms is a curriculum developed by the Cornell University. The program aims to use the principles of behavioral economics to encourage students to make healthier choices in the school lunch line.

2018: On April 28, 2018, seven local pharmacies and community organizations participated in the National DEA Medication Take-Back event. The event collected a total of 157.5 pounds of medications. One site alone, Cannon Pharmacy – Concord, collected more than 80 pounds.

In an effort to increase water intake and limit consumption of sugar sweetened beverages among children, three pediatric offices provide water bottles to patients during well-child checks. To increase the reach of the initiative, four Healthy Together 5210 schools distributed water bottles to all students, totaling 4,200 bottles

Cabarrus County Sheriff Brad Riley implemented the Stepping Up Initiative. The Stepping Up Initiative is focused on diverting people with mental illness from jails into treatment. Phase 1 included Daymark Recovery Services developing a jail-based mental health and substance use screening tool. The Stepping Up Coordinator works with the inmate to develop a transition plan post release and assists with identifying services that meet individual needs.
